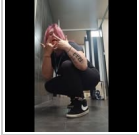

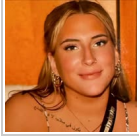

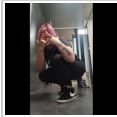

“ I was fortunate and blessed to be David’s first employee in Florida – even before there was a Landmark. Sitting in the Tenor section of First Baptist Church of Apollo Beach Choir during practice, someone from the Base section leaned over to me (then 16 years old) and asked me if I had a job. Naively, I said “no” and said nothing else for a few moments, but followed up with a pretty bad first job interview..... “are you offering a job”? “Well”, he replied, “I’m a land surveyor and I need some help for a few hours on weekends.” This was LONG before GPS or robotic equipment. He had very basic equipment to do the work but for a skilled surveyor, it was more than enough to prepare accurate, complete surveys. David just needed a body at the other end of the measuring tape.

*It was only a few hours on a Saturday and I knew NOTHING about surveying, but David patiently gave me instructions – mostly in the form of his doing the work and letting me learn by observation. The most vivid memories are measuring down the length of the center of busy roads like Shell Point Road in Ruskin, Florida (100 feet at a time - yelling out the stationing) – including crossing US 41!!! Talk about scary. He said, “When I say let go..... LET GO OF THE CHAIN”. 100’ of steel tape snapped with a jerk went flying in a spaghetti type mass across a four-lane divided highway – just barely missing being run over by oncoming traffic. “CHAIN” meant “STOP” – which could be quite important to know when walking into heavy undergrowth. Snakes and other unfriendly creatures being common in Florida. Stopping on time without questioning why meant not stepping in something you didn’t want to. I learned how to “throw” a chain since David didn’t have a chaining reel in the early days. A Plumb Bob with a Gammon Reel, how cool were those. Figuring out that wearing a hat and drinking plenty of water was necessary to keep from getting overheated. Reading the external Vernier on a transit with a magnifying glass – “turn right, read left”; Dip Needles and Chaining Pins.; miles of level runs. Good times.*

*When he finally started Landmark, I thought I would finally have a*

*chance to sit under an experienced Party Chief and learn to become a better surveyor. David, on the other hand, must have seen my potential (or perhaps he was desperate) and had me go out into the field as a Junior Party Chief -- learning on the job (including how to drive a stick shift on his blue Chev Luv pickup truck). Making mistakes along the way, David was patient with me. Letting me learn what not to do and finding that much of Land Surveying is really just common sense combined with experience. David felt strongly that the only ones not making mistakes were the ones who were doing nothing. Obviously, he expected me to learn from those blunders since that type of schooling came at a cost to him (oops). And of course David was also quick to share instructional clichés like, "If butterflies didn't have wings they'd call them butterwalks". David wasn't a big fan of "if" – at least not when used as an excuse.*

*I believe much of my own professional and personal development can be linked to David's example in life. I owe much to him and it is my prayer that my work and character is an affirmation of his legacy.*
